# **Remembrance Day Package**

The following package was created by Valour Canada to assist educators and facilitators of learning with the implementation of a Remembrance Day event or ceremony. The instructions below are merely a rough outline and can be amended or changed to meet situational needs.

### 1. Introduction

Provide students with an overview of Remembrance Day. Below are some starting questions to initiate discussion:

- What is Remembrance Day?
- What/who are we remembering?
- Why is Remembrance Day in Canada on November 11?
- What does the red poppy signify?

Additional upper level thinking questions:

- To what extent are war memorials sites of memory?
- In what ways has the memory of Canada's military history been constructed? Is there any group of people excluded?
- How has art, poetry, and literature contributed to Canada's war memory and Remembrance Day events?

Videos and online documentaries can also be used to start a discussion.

2. <u>Poem</u>

In 1915, John McCrae penned *In Flanders Fields*, one of the most well-known poems written during the First World War. Recite the poem, giving students a few moments to comprehend the significance of its words and overall meaning.

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below. We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved, and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields. Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch, be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders fields.

#### 3. <u>Acts of remembrance</u>

Think of ways in which, as a community, you can make a difference in the lives of current serving soldiers or can draw attention to the history of Remembrance Day in Canada.

Students may:

- Write a letter to a serving soldier. For more information, visit Write to the Troops.
- Watch videos/documentaries in class about soldiers who served in the First or Second World War, Korea, in Rwanda, and/or Afghanistan. Visit <u>Valour Canada's YouTube</u> page for a selection of videos.
- Visit a local museum or memorial.
- Visit digital exhibits, such as Valour Canada's <u>Veteran's Voices</u>, a collaborative digital exhibit to recognize Canadian efforts during the Second World War.
- Design their own poppies and adorn them throughout their school's hallway.
- Organize and donate to food or charity drives for local veteran's association or the Royal Canadian Legion.

The goal is to encourage students to reflect on the concepts of remembrance and commemoration while providing avenues for them to get involved in their community.

4. Two Minutes of Silence

Observe two minutes of silence for the fallen.


