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Introduction to the idea of 'foreign policy'

The following series of tasks and activities are meant to serve as an introduction to the concept of <u>foreign policy</u>. Some students/classes may already be familiar with the term, but it is often the first time they are being asked to consider its implications on nations and nationhood.

Students will complete a survey created by the Canadian Defense and Foreign Affairs Institute. Results of the nationwide survey will be analyzed to determine Canadian values in terms of Canada's foreign policy.

Some of the questions at the heart of this topic are:

- What is the point of nationhood?
- Why have "countries"?
- What might some goals of the nation of Canada be? How about other countries?
- What are the principles by which nations deal with one another?

Survey and Analysis

Activity 1:

Watch the short YouTube video <u>150 Years of Canadian Foreign Policy</u> (5m:55; Credit: OpenCanada) (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=1Fsnq0ZUENI). This clip highlights and visualizes Canada's foreign policy goals since 1867.

Consider the following questions after viewing the video:

- What kinds of decisions does Canada make about how to interact with the world?
- How are Canada's decisions seen by the rest of the world?

Next, in small groups, students will discuss what they know about the term 'foreign policy' (those decisions made by countries about how to act in the world), and what is known about aspects of Canada's current foreign policy. Each group should take 15 minutes to record three Canadian general foreign policy goals; one of the three goals should specifically involve Canada's participation in international conflicts. For another 10-15 minutes, students will share their ideas in a classroom discussion. *Teachers: Make sure that the students offer a formal definition of foreign policy toward the end of the discussion.* [30 minutes]



Activity 2:

Once the Visions of Canada: Foreign Policy Survey (see Appendix A of this document) has been distributed, students will complete the survey individually. [20 minutes]

Activity 3:

After completing the survey, the class' results will be collated by a student and the numbers will be recorded on the "Class Results vs. Country Results" page (Appendix B). Students will, either in class or for homework, compare the Canadian results (to be handed out) with their class' results for comparison. Students should write at least 3 statements that may be explanatory for any similarities and/or differences in the results.

Activity 4:

In small groups, students compare the survey results of their class versus the national results using the following guiding questions:

- Where the class and national results are different, why do you think this is so?
- Where the results are similar, why do you think this is so?
- Do you think age makes a difference when it comes to decision making about the country? Why? How?
- Do you think other factors, such as ethnicity, gender, language, etc., play into the differences of opinion on what Canada should do in the world?
- After review of the results for Canada, what was most interesting to you and why?

Students are welcome to come up with ideas, theories, and questions about what the causes of similarities and differences between the two data sets may be. [20 minutes]

Discuss student ideas, theories, questions, and comments as a class. [20 minutes]

Follow Up Lesson

In response to the results of the foreign policy survey, the teacher can introduce the Nationalism Spectrum (Appendix C), pointing out the different approaches to the question, "What should Canada do in the world?"

The teacher hands out the keyword definitions worksheet as well as the homework assignment with the attached rubric. Students must make their own comments, based on what they learned from the survey work, on each term from the spectrum. Then they are asked to respond to the question provided. [20 minutes]
